### Are you new to the Allen School District or have you had an addition to your family?



The School District Census Report is a requirement from the Department of Education that is due every July for children ages 0 - 21 that reside in our school district. These numbers are used by the Nebraska Department of Education for state aid and for federal funding. This list is also used to invite children who are eligible to be enrolled in Pre-School and Kindergarten each spring.

If you are new to our district or know of anyone who is new to our district you are encouraged to contact the school to provide us information. State statute and board policy requires that the school district establishes a permanent, continuing census of all children age 0 - 21, and to maintain this census on yearly basis.

Just a reminder: the TIPS reporting link is on the school website and can be used to allow the anonymous reporting of bullying, weapons, abuse, vandalism, suicide risks and other concerning behaviors that may have a negative effect on the school's learning environment. TIPS can also be used to report acts of kindness or other make positive comments in something called a Hero report.

How it works: if you are worried about friends, students or others, or if you witness concerning behaviors, simply go to the Allen School website (<u>www.allenschools.org</u>) and click on the TIPS REPORT INCIDENT button under Quicklinks on the right side of the website. Select the appropriate incident type, share the necessary details and then SUBMIT.

Once an incident report is made, the principal and designated staff members are immediately notified via email and can securely review the report details to begin coordinating an appropriate assessment and response. TIPS provides all team members with the right tools to track and document the actions taken, see related reports, set automated reminders, review past reports, check school policy, and connect the right dots so no students or incidents are overlooked.

Please keep in mind that due to confidentiality issues, it may not be possible for reporters to be informed on how their report was handled and/or how the situation was resolved.

### Wrapping up your Senior year . . .

Seniors ~ stay on track to college by completing these second semester tasks:

- ◆ <u>Complete the financial aid process</u>. By now, you should have filed your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). If you haven't, complete and file the form at <u>fafsa.gov</u>. If your college requests verification of your FAFSA information, you must submit required documents before the school will award financial aid.
- <u>Watch your student portal and email closely</u>. Once you're accepted for admission, the colleges you listed on your FAFSA will notify you of the financial aid they're offering.
- ◆ <u>Keep your grades up</u>. If you slack off and get poor grades this semester, your college could revoke your admission.
- <u>Apply for scholarships</u>. See *ScholarshipQuest* at <u>www.EducationQuest.org</u> to find Nebraska-based scholarships. You'll also find links to national scholarship sites that are EducationQuest-approved.
- ◆ <u>Make your final college selection</u>. Notify the other colleges so they can take you off their mailing list.
- <u>Be aware of deadlines</u> to accept financial aid and college admission offers, submit your housing deposit, and register for new-student orientation.

### Juniors . . . It's time to narrow your college choices.

Narrow your college choices soon to prepare for these upcoming activities:

- ◆ <u>ACT Test</u>: When you take the ACT this spring, you'll be asked to provide a list of colleges that should receive your score.
- <u>Completion of the FAFSA early next fall</u>. You and your parents can complete the FAFSA beginning October 1 of your senior year. The colleges that you list on the form will receive the results.
- ◆ <u>College Applications</u>. Early next fall, it will be time to apply to your top college choices. You'll get help at school if you high school holds an Apply2College event.

Katie Bathke (2019 Graduate) attended the National Association of Academies of Science, American Junior Academy of Science Annual conference in Seattle, WA in February. At the annual conference Katie presented her scientific research to the academy and was inducted as an honorary lifetime fellow to the American Junior Academy of Science. She was one of 152 high school students that were selected from across the country to present their research

and be inducted as a national fellow. To be eligible to attend the national event a student has to be selected by their home state academy of science. Katie's project was one of 5 projects selected by the Nebraska Academy of Science during the 2017 Nebraska State Science Fair. The title of her research project is "The Development of Bacillus subtilia as an Environmental Competitor for Bacterial Leaf Streak". Katie conducted her research at Allen Consolidated Schools in the conjunction with WSC and UNL. This marks the 3rd consecutive year Katie has presented her research at the NAAS/AJAS National Science Symposium.



### **Innovative Youth Corn Challenge Contest 2019 Results**

Science, Technology, engineering, and math (STEM) careers are in high demand and will continue to be in the future years. To engage youth in crop science-based education, the Innovative Youth Corn Challenge program's inception in 2012, 53 teams have participated in the program with 32 teams successfully harvesting and analyzing their plot data. A total of 148 youth have participated. This contest, open to 4-H members or FFA members guided participants through all aspects of corn production, as well as agricultural careers related to corn production.

The winning team from the 2019 growing season was the Kornhusker Kids 4-H Club. Receiving second place was the Allen-Wakefield FFA Chapter which consisted of Katie Bathke and Ashley Kraemer with Jeff Geiger as their sponsor and Josh Batenhorst as their advisor. They wanted to test a polymicrobial solution for bulk fertilizers called Nachurs Rhyzo-Link LF. The hypothesized that the treated plants would yield better due to the five Bacillus strains creating a better environment for the roots. They found that Rhyzo-Link plot had a yield of 243 bu/acre compared to 240 bu/acre for the control, with five replications. Third place went to the Rising Starts 4-H club from Platte County.

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The Nebraska Department of Education is in the process of unifying language for safety procedures across schools in the state. The procedures requiring action are called "Standard Response Protocol" and consist of 4 main actions—lockout, lockdown, evacuate, and shelter. According to NDE, the Standard Response Protocol "is the uniform classroom immediate response to any incident. Protocol not only enables rapid response determination when an unforeseen incident occurs but also allows for a more predictable series of actions as an incident unfolds. By standardizing the vocabulary, everyone immediately involved can understand the response and status of the incident."

Here at school, we will be practicing drills based on these four actions and discussing ways to improve our response effectiveness and timing. If you come to school and see a sign on the door, it will give information and indicate the type of drill being practiced. Please don't be alarmed, and just know that we are practicing so that we can better protect our students. In the event that we would ever need to evacuate the building for any reason, our Parent Reunification Site will be the Methodist Church, 402 Summit Drive, Allen.

In the case of an emergency, we would ask that parents and community members keep the following in mind:

- Parents and relatives should <u>NOT</u> respond to the incident site (<u>school</u>) to allow public safety personnel time to respond to the incident.
- Students will be released only to approved adults at the evacuation/reunification site (Methodist Church).
- All members of the community should avoid driving anywhere within several blocks of the incident or evacuation/reunification site.
- All members of the community should avoid using cellular phones for the first several hours of the situation. This is to help keep cellular phone service from collapsing, as it has in a number of school crisis events. School and public safety officials may be heavily reliant on cellular service during a crisis.
- Concerned parties should not call the school, school board members, or public safety dispatch centers to get information regarding the incident or particular students and employees. Personnel at these locations will be extremely busy, and often do not have information regarding each evacuee. Inquiries severely hamper efforts to manage the crisis properly.

We certainly hope we **<u>NEVER</u>** have to actually use these procedures, but we want to be as prepared and responsive as we can possibly be if we do.
