A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Below is an announcement that was sent out by Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department. This announcement serves as a reminder that we have to stay vigilant in keeping ourselves as well as others around us safe and healthy:

Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department (NNPHD) was notified by the Nebraska Department of Health that the U.K. B.1.1.7. COVID-19 Variant has been identified as having infected someone living in the NNPHD Health District. The U.K. Variant has proven to be more infectious (spreads faster) and research has just identified that it also causes more severe illness than the original COVID-19 virus. The U.K. and 27 other countries in Europe are currently experiencing a surge in cases due to the B.1.1.7. variant and as more people become ill with this new variant, there will likely be more severe cases and subsequently more hospitalizations and deaths. The presence of a viral variant in the local population provides a strong reminder of the importance for each of us to use every possible intervention we have available to slow the spread of the virus.

Assessment Season

April is the start of many seasons in our area. One major event that April brings specifically for the school is the start of Nebraska state testing. The Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS), pronounced "en-skass," is a new statewide assessment system that embodies Nebraska's holistic view of students and helps them prepare for success in postsecondary education, career, and civic life. It uses multiple measures throughout the year to provide educators and decision makers at all levels with the insights they need to support student learning. NSCAS tests are the state assessments that all schools in Nebraska will take to see how each school is performing. The NSCAS tests are based on state standards that each classroom teacher is teaching. The benefits of NSCAS testing are that it will give an equal comparison of all schools in the state. The drawback of NSCAS is that it is a onetime test that does not take into account a student having a bad day and not doing as well as they might on a different day. There are a number of things that you can do as parents to help your students be successful during this time. Below are test taking tips that you could talk to your son or daughter about to make sure they do the best that they can.

- ◆ Read the directions for each test carefully.
- ◆ Read each question carefully.
- ◆ Pace yourself—don't spend too much time on a single passage or question.
- ◆ Pay attention to the announcement of five minutes remaining on each test.
- ◆ Answer the easy questions first, then go back and answer the more difficult ones if you have time remaining on that test.
- ◆ On difficult questions, eliminate as many incorrect answers as you can, then make an educated guess among those remaining.
- ◆ **Answer every question.** Your scores on the multiple-choice tests are based on the number of questions you answer correctly. **There is no penalty for guessing.**
- ◆ If you complete a test before time is called, recheck your work on that test.
- ◆ Make sure you get a good night sleep before the test.
- ◆ Make sure you eat breakfast before you come to school.

More information will be in the school announcements as well as coming home with individual students as we get closer to the NSCAS test taking days. When those assessments are scheduled it is imperative that your child receive plenty of sleep the night before and that they have a nutritious and filling breakfast. It is also very important that your child come to school that day so that we have 100% participation.

Safety / Crisis Information

The Nebraska Department of Education is in the process of unifying language for safety procedures across schools in the state. The procedures requiring action are called "Standard Response Protocol" and consist of 4 main actions—lockout, lockdown, evacuate, and shelter. According to NDE, the Standard Response Protocol "is the uniform classroom immediate response to any incident. Protocol not only enables rapid response determination when an unforeseen incident occurs but also allows for a more predictable series of actions as an incident unfolds. By standardizing the vocabulary, everyone immediately involved can understand the response and status of the incident."

Here at school, we will be practicing drills based on these four actions and discussing ways to improve our response effectiveness and timing. If you come to school and see a sign on the door, it will give information and indicate the type of drill being practiced. Please don't be alarmed, and just know that we are practicing so that we can better protect our students.

In the event that we would ever need to evacuate the building for any reason, our Parent Reunification Site will be the Methodist Church, 402 Summit Drive, Allen.

In the case of an emergency, we would ask that parents and community members keep the following in mind:

Parents and relatives should **NOT** respond to the incident site (**school**) to allow public safety personnel time to respond to the incident.

Students will be released only to approved adults at the evacuation/reunification site (**Methodist Church**).

All members of the community should avoid driving anywhere within several blocks of the incident or evacuation/reunification site.

All members of the community should avoid using cellular phones for the first several hours of the situation. This is to help keep cellular phone service from collapsing, as it has in a number of school crisis events. School and public safety officials may be heavily reliant on cellular service during a crisis.

Concerned parties should not call the school, school board members, or public safety dispatch centers to get information regarding the incident or particular students and employees. Personnel at these locations will be extremely busy, and often do not have information regarding each evacuee. Inquiries severely hamper efforts to manage the crisis properly.

We certainly hope we **NEVER** have to actually use these procedures, but we want to be as prepared and responsive as we can possibly be if we do.

Allen Consolidated Schools Improves Student Safety with TIPS



Just a reminder: the TIPS reporting link is on the school website and can be used to allow the anonymous reporting of bullying, weapons, abuse, vandalism, suicide risks and other concerning behaviors that may have a negative effect on the school's learning environment. TIPS can also be used to report acts of kindness or other make positive comments in something called a Hero report.

How it works: if you are worried about friends, students or others, or if you witness concerning behaviors, simply go to the Allen School website (www.allenschools.org) and click on the TIPS REPORT INCIDENT button.

Select the appropriate incident type, share the necessary details and then SUBMIT.

Once an incident report is made, the principal and designated staff members are immediately notified via email and can securely review the report details to begin coordinating an appropriate assessment and response. TIPS provides all team members with the right tools to track and document the actions taken, see related reports, set automated reminders, review past reports, check school policy, and connect the right dots so no students or incidents are overlooked.

Please keep in mind that due to confidentiality issues, it may not be possible for reporters to be informed on how their report was handled and/or how the situation was resolved.

HANDICAPPED CHILDREN'S ACT

News from the Music Department: It is hard to believe that it is already APRIL! Back in March, we had our first concert of the year live in person. We called it the "Welcome Back Concert" instead of the Pops Concert. It was nice to have a little normalcy in our lives even though we are nowhere near what we call normal.

We are preparing for our **Pre-District Music Concert which will take place on April 13th at 7pm in the Allen Gymnasium.** After that concert, we will continue to practice and get ready for **District Music Contest on April 23rd in South Sioux City.** District Music Contest this year will be different than past years because of Covid 19. The following guidelines will take place at the District Music Contest:

Covid-19 Protocols in place at South Sioux:

Masks: Everyone is required to wear a mask at all times while in the building. This includes wearing a mask while performing. Instrumentalists need to make sure they have masks that work for them while playing.

Bell Covers: All instrumentalists who play wind instruments must also have bell covers on their instruments.

Spacing: All students must be spaced 6 feet apart in all directions and facing the same way while performing. Trombones must have 9 feet of space in front of them. For the choral ensembles we will not be performing on choral risers.

Clearing of space: For large groups, all warm-up and performance areas will have a minimum of 20 minutes when the room will be cleared to air out the space. For solos and small ensembles, after 30 minutes of performing, each center will be cleared for a minimum of 20 minutes to air out the space.

In addition, all chairs and percussion equipment must be sprayed and sanitized between uses. Percussionists will use their own mallets and sticks.

Audience: There will be no audience in the performance areas. In the large group performance areas, only the performers, director, accompanist, judges, host monitor, and stage crew members will be allowed. In the solo/small ensemble performance areas, only the performer (s), accompanist, judge, and the room monitor. If the performers' director is not the accompanist, they may be in the room to watch them perform. If the accompanist has a page turner, then that person is allowed in the room.

As you can see, guests will not be allowed at District Music Contest. We hope to have a plan to keep parents, guardians, and residents informed on how the day is going and results from our performances. We will not know the times of performances until the week of April 12th.

April is a very busy month for our students who are involved in music and athletics. I encourage you to make sure your child is practicing their music at home, especially if they are doing a solo or small ensemble. We are doing some great things here in the Music Department and we will continue to work harder and improve every day!

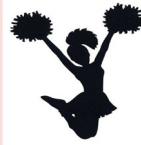
Competitive Speech News

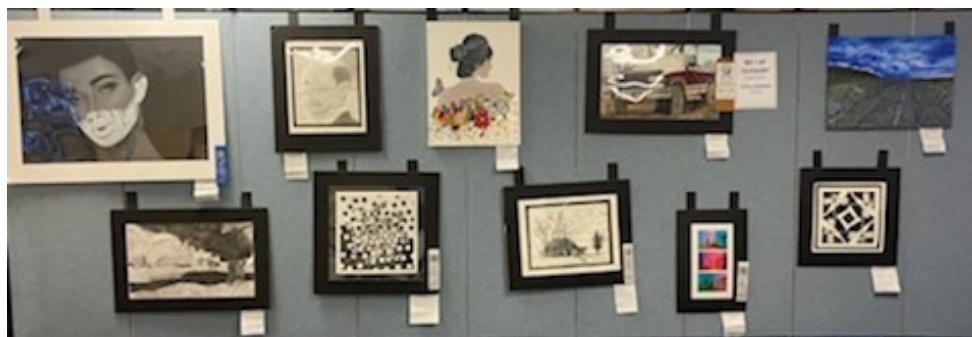

Hunter Education Online Courses and Hunt Safe Sessions

Nebraska Game and Parks began offering a new online course option. The online courses are designed to be completed over a period of six to eight hours, allowing students to work at their own pace. There is no time limit for completing the course. Game and Parks recommends that students age 11 to 15 complete the course with the assistance of a parent.

Students age 11 to 15 years old who successfully complete the online course must also complete a Hunt Safe Session.

The Hunt Safe Session is a two-hour review focusing on equipment safety for both firearms and archery, tree stand safety and shoot/don't shoot scenarios.

A vendor fee will be charged for each online course and is requested at the time of course completion. Hunt Safe Sessions are offered state-wide, free of charge.

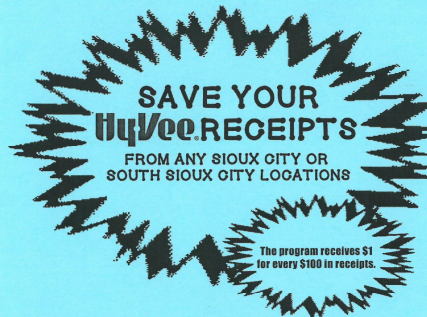
The School District Census Report is a requirement from the Department of Education that is due every July for children ages 0 - 21 that reside in our school district. These numbers are used by the Nebraska Department of Education for state aid and for federal funding. This list is also used to invite children who are eligible to be enrolled in Pre-School and Kindergarten each spring.

If you are new to our district or know of anyone who is new to our district you are encouraged to contact the school to provide us information. State statute and board policy requires that the school district establishes a permanent, continuing census of all children age 0 - 21, and to maintain this census on yearly basis.
